

PROPOSITION

In the year 2020, the country "INDIA" was impacted by the deadly Covid 19 global pandemic virus. It affected billions of people around the world and claimed approximately 5 Lakhs deaths in "India." The Indian government implemented a rigorous lockdown beginning on March 21st, 2020, in response to an uptick in cases and regular increases in fatalities.

According to government standards, which are very explicit about this, laid down certain guidelines specifying that:-

- No one should leave their home except in an emergency.
- No commercial establishments other than medical supply stores and urgent-care centres shall be opened.
- No public or private transportation should be operating, with the exception of emergency transports.
- The operation of all trains, flights, and buses was halted.

When people were found breaking the rules set by the government, fines were applied and they were even arrested.

Numerous small-scale companies, such as shops, continued to operate throughout the rigorous lockdown and dangerous crisis even though they were not emergency stores.

On July 15, 2021, there was a store called Mishra Ji's Shop in Sawaraj Nagar, close to the airport in Delhi. It was a well-known store in the market, and it opened at four in the evening. At that same time, police personnel were monitoring the area as directed by the government. Since his shop wasn't one of the emergency stores, the police officers observed him and questioned him about why he had opened it during the epidemic. The owner was unable to provide a sufficient justification for why he decided to operate the shop.

In response, the police issued him a fine of Rs. 5000, which was not provided by the owner. As a result, he began acting inappropriately toward the police. In response, a police officer detained him on charges of misbehaving with an officer who was on duty and operating a business during a pandemic, even though there were clear instructions from the Indian government not to do so.
